LAWS OF THE GAME

1. A player with an obvious goalscoring opportunity inside the opponents' penalty area is struck by a boot thrown by an opponent who is outside his own penalty area. What decision should the referee make?

A referee's perspective

"Before attending the Centre of Refereeing Excellence (CORE) we had no idea what to expect. We got the programme, from which we could see that the course was going to be intense, but that's all.
